c. Trustee Report

Karin and Lynn were not able to make it.

First, let me apologize for both of us not being available for tonight's meeting. It was not the plan, but other matters have come up for each of us.

1- We're excited to welcome a new Board of Trustees. AS you probably know, both Lynn and myself were acclaimed in this election, and are honored to continue serving you in this capacity. Also acclaimed were incumbent trustees Lorrie Shelp representing Kinuso/Joussard and Adrian Wong representing High Prairie, as well as returning trustees Joy McGregor from Slave Lake and Tammy Henkel from High Prairie(following a tie vote, resulting in a draw fro a hat situation) and new trustee Cory Hughes from Slave Lake. Joy McGregor has been elected as Chair while Tammy Henkel has been elected as Vice-chair.

2- We went through a thorough, and yet to be completed, trustee orientation. We also held our organizational meeting on October 20. Our first regular Board meeting was held on Tuesday, October 26.

3- We've gone through our Board year plan and have set dates for future meetings, including setting our regular Board meetings to be held on the 3rd Tuesday of every month (4th if the need arises)

4- Both Lynn and I received long service awards from the Alberta School Board's Association – Lynn for serving 2 terms and Karin for serving 5 terms, thus far.

5- ASCA AGM is being held April 24/2022. The deadline for submission of any resolutions from school councils is January 15, 2022. Please sign up on the website in order to be able to vote on resolutions as well as to access any information regarding the conference or resolutions. Also, due to a drastic reduction in government funding, changes to ASCA needed to be made. Workshops that used to be offered at no charge to member boards, now have a charge. HPSD Board of Trustees has paid the \$1000 fee to allow for 3 workshops throughout the division. These can of course be used by individual councils or groups of councils. Contact HPSD main office for any further information.

6- The Board of Trustees have voted in favor of adding a Health Spending Account opportunity to Board members, to match benefit offerings of HPSD employees. This would be a benefit of up to \$860/trustee, with any unused portion returning to HPSD, and will only come into effect for September 2022, barring any changes.

7- At the regular meeting on October 26, the Board discussed the idea of holding 'live' meetings; either live or updated at the end of the meeting, depending on bandwidth capabilities. Since our meetings are almost always held during school time, the bandwidth capabilities could be overextended to run live, as was evidenced with some of our graduation streams last year. This would lend well to accountability and transparency as well as offer a great resource opportunity for Social Studies units including government. WE are currently looking into costing out and gathering information on logistics of this to be reviewed at a future meeting.

8- Another discussion was held regarding the mandatory vaccination policy for adults within HPSD. Suggestions were made to push the implementation to a later date and to reconsider altogether. Discussions included the sufficiency of safety measures already being taken as well as the plans for possible shortages of bus drivers, educators, support workers, etc. Some see a potential for a gap in services while others aren't sure this problem will come to fruition. At this point, no further vote was agreed to and we await the Administrative Procedure that will address this. We will keep you apprised. The Board was advised by our admin team that both our legal counsels and insurance recommendations guided us to the current decision as it stands, citing a potential for significant increases in premiums or legal liabilities, but there are Boards (ex. Peace River School Division) that have opted to not enforce the vaccines. We will continue to keep you apprised of anything to do with this as well. Lynn and I continue to be focused on decision-making through at least 3 lenses: 1- What are we hearing from our constituents? 2- What is our Mandate as an educational organization? And 3- What is in the best interest of the education of the students we serve?

7. New Business

a. AERR (Annual Education Results Report) - (survey goes out to kids and parents and teachers and pulls data from standardized testing, completion rates).

Vanier: Very happy with most of the results. A few out of our control –not applicable. Student growth and achievement, high school completion rate –happy with these results. Teaching and leading –education quality –at 92%. Access to supports and services -10% above the province –ex: if kids need access to occupational therapy, behavioural therapy, learning supports.

Input: 3 year completion, 4 year completion, 5 year completion. Dropout rate is extremely low. Parents gave input, it seems most agree that kids will graduate at own rate but require the proper supports to attempt graduation in 3 years.

Citizenship –overall looks good but some numbers are concerning.

Routhier: Compared to the province, doing very well. Look for areas where we can improve –citizenship.

Discussion:

1. How important is it that our children complete high school in 3 years? We need to see kids be able to complete high school in 3 years and we need to focus on getting them to where they need to be to get there. The majority that can graduate in 3 years should but there are some that will need the extra time and it's good for the schools to give them the extra time. Talk to the graduated people and ask how effective they feel the education was and if it helped them in their job choice/career. Most people seem to agree to sliding scale –some will graduate in 3 years and others will need longer. Consider how covid may have longer impact with children being behind. Advocating for enough resources for kids so that they can finish on time more often.
2. What can we do, to ensure parents, staff, and students are in partnership in citizenship? Be kind. Citizenship awareness? Core values that focus on being good citizens, talk about the values in class and use examples of that to help teach students.
3. What does an active citizen look like in grade K-6? Discrepancy –do kids help each other and respect each other –the kids thought they were doing a good job but the parents did not. When kids come home there is always more to the story and so parents can then take that time to discuss more and teach. Maybe that means that kids are resilient and more so than parents think. Possibly it's more related to the transition from grade 6 to grade 7 and they are maturing more –less parent involvement.
4. What can we do to involve more parents? Suggest to have grade level nights where parents could come in and engage. Not sure what the answer –reach out to parents, bring back parent teacher interviews, ASCA board seems to be putting an emphasis on parent involvement – parent-school connection to get the child able to move forward. Call and ask, more personal reach out and then possibly parents would be more inclined to join boards. Maybe the school could do a parade of programs. Parents also need to seek out opportunities based on their interests and resources. Push out information, people are more likely to pay attention than the website.
5. Do you like the social media pictures? Does it make you feel more connected? Yes –parents like this.

b. School Council Engagement Grant

Superintendent said we were eligible for grant. Up to school and school division what to do with that funding. ?no plans yet for division wide...might be up to the schools or school councils to spend the money. We will get 1000\$. Any ideas what we could do with that money?
